My very first class at seminary, on the first Monday morning at 9 AM in 1998 was The Church's Struggle against Apartheid in South Africa with Rev. Dr. Peter Storey as the professor. He had been Nelson Mandela's chaplain on Robbins Island for part of his long imprisonment there. He had worked with Archbishop Desmond Tutu in the struggle at one time being Tutu's boss as President of the Board at the South Africa Council of Churches. He has written part of the Nobel Peace Prize application for Tutu nomination. I wanted to take the class because my high school history teacher in the 1970s, and at that time Lay

United Methodist pastor, had spoken passionately about the immorality of apartheid.

It was a fascinating story of how apartheid had come to be, and then the struggle to end that had happened just a few years earlier in the 1990s. Apartheid was the separation of "races" with the white minority controlling the black and colored majority, limiting where people could live, jobs they could have, what they could own in terms of property, even where they travel in their own country and much more. It was an evil immoral system that was held in place by laws and brutally enforced upon population. The Dutch Reformed Church of South Africa had based their support of apartheid on the Bible. Dr. Storey had been involved in the struggle to end it as church leader for 30 some years. As you can imagine, it was utterly fascinating to learn the struggle against apartheid, really still a current news story of the day, from someone so intimately involved.

All in all the classes was quite an experience. We got to the end of it and many of the class were exhausted by the brutality of apartheid, the amount of effort and energy that it had taken to end something that seemed so easily so obviously patently immoral. And it had been supported by a church as biblically based. At same time we had hope that things could change in this world. God's grace and love could move mountains. God's kingdom of peace and justice and love could happen in this world now.

My high school teacher and Dr. Storey are undoubtedly some of the reason I have a passion for social justice in my life and ministry today. The same social justice that I see Jesus working for when he called for the widows and orphans to be cared for by the community. In that time if you were without family you had no support, no help for rough times. The same social justice Jesus did when healed someone of a disease that had excluded them from society. It was not just the healing of the body in many of those cases, it was also bringing them back into relationship with even their own family, allowing them to live together again rather than isolated at literal edges of the villages begging for scraps of food to survive. Jesus didn't only heal bodies, he healed relationships, he healed families bringing them back together in mutual love and support.

For a final paper he asked us take the lessons we had learned and apply them to a situation of social injustice today. It was interesting the number of things people named that they saw application. And we talked about it in the last class, someone said "there is so much that needs to be addressed, how do we possibly know what to do? Which one should we address? Which one can we give our energy and effort to?"

In addition to all the information of the class, how churches did work to end apartheid and the personal experiences that Dr. Storey related, his answer to that question is one thing I value from the class. He said, there will be some things that tug at you in a way that others do not. For whatever reason, your personal history and experiences, perhaps the gifts you have, some thing will call out to you. It may not be the BIG MOMENTOUS MOVEMENTS in history, but there will be some things that touch you in a special way. As religious people we would say the Holy Spirit is

guiding you. Those you spend yourself on. Give more of yourself. More of your time, talents and dollars to. There will be other things that you also want to support but it will not be in the same way, with the same amount of time, talents or dollars.

That has really stuck with me. Yes there are things I care about more than others. I don't exactly know why. It just is. Those things get the most of me. And I support other things as I can, with what I can. I make choices.

So this is all a long story to say thank you at how generous this congregation is, in supporting the many projects we are doing. I often worry that we are asking too much for too many things. Yet the support is there time and time again. **Thank you. Thank you.**

I also want to say that I don't support every project we do equally in time, talent or dollars. Those that touch me receive more than others. And that is okay.

We, you and I, are church together. One project that calls to one person may not touch another. A different project that calls you may not have the same moving on another. We are church together. We do projects together, some may support a project a lot, others may support a given project a little, some may not support a specific project at all. On other projects that gets reversed. We do projects together and that is our strength and our balance. It works out. Despite being Lutheran, there should not be any guilt in not supporting projects all the same. We give as we are given to, and as we are called to give.

It works out because **WE ARE CHURCH TOGETHER**.







Light the Way

What you need:

- Unlined white notecards
- Hot glue (and adult help)
- Yellow tissue paper
- Mini muffin liners
- Clothespins

What you do:

- 1. Roll a notecard from side to side into a "candle" tube. Secure with glue.
- 2. Insert a piece of tissue paper "flame" in one end.
- 3. Glue the other end to a muffin liner. Then glue the liner to a clothespin.
- 4. Repeat to make many paper candles. Pin them to the branches of a Christmas tree.
