Reformation Conversation

Sunday August 7 2 p.m.

Grace will be hosting a Sunday afternoon conversation for the community on the Reformation with church members from Germany who are visiting Alpena. First Congregational UCC has 24 people visiting from their sister church in Germany for 2 weeks the beginning of August.

The 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation is chance to look at church today in various parts of the world and how we have lived out our faith since that momentous event.

Join us in greeting the German visitors and hearing their perspective on faith today.

To consider and vote on the recommended Purpose Statement and Guiding Principles that have developed from the visioning process of the last year.



I had the occasion recently to tell the parable of the Prodigal Son to a group of non-church people I was with, to illustrate a point I was making. I invite you to **stop right now** and reread that parable in Luke 15:11-32 so it is fresh in your mind as you read on. And I ask you do read it and not just remember it. There's a question to answer!

After summarizing the parable, I told the story of a seminary professor who had taught the parable in 3 very different places during the course of 1 year. In each place after the story was read, he asked the question, "What was the sin in the story?" Well in Africa, the students replied the sin was not offering hospitality. The younger son was in a foreign land and the people were not offering hospitality to a stranger. In St. Petersburg, Russia, the response to the question was, "There was no sin. There was a famine in the land."

And your response to the question? If you are like most Americans, you said, "He squandered his money in dissolute living." And most probably you did not even "hear" the world famine in your reading of the scripture.


In each situation, people interpreted out of their local context. What actions or characteristics or values are held the highest in the local culture. In Africa, in a culture in many places still very similar to Jesus' time, hospitality to the stranger or traveler was a highly held communal value. In St. Petersburg, there had been a devastating famine during the German siege of World War II and every family had lost members. And in our culture, well to be wasteful with money, squandering it, is looked down on. So that is what is most often heard here.

I've used this illustration before in classes and maybe a sermon or two. It speaks to how all we are, our history, our family of origin, our society, our experiences make up how we interpret the world and create our world view.

As I told this illustration to this group, I realized that there were also several mind sets portrayed within the story that showed characters' world view also. The younger son never imagined the grace of his father. Perhaps in his guilt, he could not imagine being received with open arms. I can't imagine that this was the first time the father showed such grace to him. Yet the son was limited in what he could see. And the older son. He could not get beyond so much being done for his younger brother when he had been "good" all along. Perhaps he was not seeing all the grace and love he had received all along.

For both, their views and experiences did not allow them to see beyond themselves to the bigger picture. And that is hard. To imagine grace, when we don't think we deserve it. We get so limited by what we have experienced and know, that we can not imagine, or believe in more than that. It does take real work, real risk, to believe differently than all we "know." Yet that is what the Gospel calls us to do. To be open to the possibility of a good God beyond our beliefs. I invite you into that. To be open, to risk, to explore, to share in all of God's good grace for this world. To live in that love

There are several youth from Grace who have joined The Relay For Life "Team Triple Threat" on







- Cardstock
- Glue

- Pebbles
- Black paint
- Paintbrush
- Sand or glitter
- Broken crayons (2 or 3)

What you do:

- 1. On the left side of the cardstock, trace a 3"-high letter T with glue. Place twigs on the glue lines.
- 2. Trace an R of the same size. Place pebbles on that glue.
- 3. Use black paint to make a U.
- 4. Trace an S in glue. Pour sand (or glitter) on top.
- 5. Make another T with glue. Place the crayons on top.
- 6. After the poster dries, shake off the excess sand (or glitter) into a trash can.
